

SOCIAL WORKER'S CORNER

According to healthychildren.org, if your child is missing many days of school, or a few days every single month, it's important to consider the reason for the absenteeism.

A nationwide study found that kids with ADHD, autism or developmental delays are twice as likely to be chronically absent compared to kids without these conditions.

Children with common chronic illnesses, such as asthma and type 1 diabetes, miss more school when they are having more symptoms.

Mental health conditions, like anxiety or depression, are common reasons for absences.

Up to 5% of children have school-related anxiety and may struggle to understand or explain why they refuse to attend school.

If you are in need of resources, please reach out to your school social worker or school counselor. Every student in the district has an identified school social worker and school guidance counselor.



CAREER TECH SPOTLIGHT

Heights Career Tech offers courses through a five-district consortium, which includes Bedford, Cleveland Heights, Maple Heights, Shaker Heights, and Warrensville Heights High Schools.

The 22 academic programs are open to 11th and 12th graders who have the opportunity to earn professional certifications, industry-recognized credentials, and college credit.

The Engineering and Science Technologies - Engineering, Robotics, and Machining program is designed to allow students to apply theoretical science and mathematical concepts in a projectbased, authentic learning environment. The program's courses engage students in engineering and manufacturing processes to go from student's initial designs to finished products through fascinating, real-world projects and activities that help students develop thinking and communication skills. Students use a variety of tools, equipment, and machinery including: 3D Printers, Laser Cutters, Thermal Vacuum Formers, Wind Tunnels, Industrial Robots, and Industrial Mills and Lathes.



SECURITY SCOOP

FROM MR. WATTERS, COORDINATOR FOR SAFETY AND SECURITY

We will participate in a school-wide lockdown drill on Thursday, March 23.

Please review the following protocol for a Level 3 Lockdown:

Level 3 - Active Shooter Response and Evacuation - "ALICE" is an acronym for five (5) steps you can utilize in order to increase your chances of surviving a surprise attack by an Active Shooter. The five steps are Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate. It is important to remember that the "ALICE" response does not follow a set of actions you "shall, must, or will" do when confronted with an Active Shooter. Your survival is paramount in this situation. Deal with known information and don't worry about unknowns. You may use only 1 or 2 parts of the response plan or you may have to use all 5. In this type of incident, your perception is the reality and you will be deciding what the appropriate action for you to take is.
