LOCKDOWN DRILL: MAY 21

On **Tuesday, May 21** Heights High will have a lockdown drill. It will be a **Level 2 Modified Drill**.

Here are the expectations per CH-UH's Emergency Guidelines and Procedures:

All exterior and interior doors are locked; movement with the school is allowed only by an announcement from the administration. No entry into or exit from the building is allowed. Students are to return to their rooms immediately. Students who are outside of a classroom are to move indoors to a classroom immediately. Activity in the classroom continues as usual.

Asian American & Pacific Islander Heritage Month

Advancing Leaders Through Innovation

Asian American & Pacific Islander Heritage Month (AAPI Heritage Month) is an annual celebration in May that recognizes the historical and cultural contributions of individuals and groups of Asian and Pacific Islander descent to the United States. The effort to officially recognize Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander contributions to the United States began in the late 1970s, and took over 10 years to make it a permanent month-long celebration.

The AAPI umbrella term includes cultures from the entire Asian continent—including East, Southeast and South Asia—and the Pacific Islands of Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia. As of the 2020 U.S. Census, there were about 20.6 million people of Asian or Pacific Islander descent in the United States. According to the Pew Research Center, AAPI people are a diverse and growing population that make up about 7 percent of the total U.S. population.



Stated by the FAPAC, this theme "pays homage to the visionaries and trailblazers who have shaped our AANHPI history and continue to influence our collective future."

Duke Kahanamoku (1890 - 1968)

Duke Paoa Kahinu Mokoe Hulikohola Kahanamoku was a Hawaiian competition swimmer who popularized the sport of surfing.

A Native Hawaiian, he was born to a minor noble family less than three years before the overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom. He lived to see the territory's admission as a state, and became a United States citizen.

Kahanamoku was a five-time Olympic medalist in swimming, having competed in the 1912 Olympics in Stockholm, the 1920 Olympics in Antwerp, and the 1924 Olympics in Paris. Kahanamoku also was an alternate for the U.S. water polo team at the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles.

Following his trail-blazing athletic career, Kahanamoku worked as an actor, sheriff, and surfer, helping to popularize the Hawaiian sport of surfing to a new generation of surfers all over the world.

JEWISH AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

Jewish American Heritage Month is an annual celebration that recognizes the historical and cultural contributions of people of Jewish descent and identity to the United States. The effort to officially recognize Jewish American contributions to the United States began in 1980 initially with special week in April or May for Jewish heritage celebrations. Finally, on April 20, 2006, President George W. Bush proclaimed that May would be Jewish American Heritage Month.

The announcement was the crowning achievement in an effort by the Jewish Museum of Florida and South Florida Jewish community leaders that resulted in resolutions introduced by Representative Debbie Wasserman Schultz of Florida and Senator Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania urging the president to proclaim a month that would recognize the <u>370-year history</u> of Jewish contributions to American achievements and culture.


EMMA LAZARUS (1849 - 1887)

Born in New York, Emma Lazarus was an American author of poetry, prose, and translations, as well as an activist for Jewish causes.

Of Sephardi Jewish descent, her ancestors were originally from Portugal and they were among the original twenty-three Portuguese Jews who arrived in New Amsterdam – now New York – after they had fled from their settlement in Recife, Brazil to escape the Spanish Inquisition.

Lazarus used her poems and essays to speak out against the persecution of Jews in Europe and growing antisemitism in the United States. She publicly proclaimed her identity as a Jewish poet and advocated for Jewish issues internationally.

Lazarus is most famous for her poem, "The New Colossus," that is engraved at the base of the Statue of Liberty. Her words "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free," are almost as well-known as the Statue itself.
